What is FGM?

FGM is an illegal procedure where the female genital organs are deliberately cut, injured or changed and there is no medical reason for this. It is frequently a very traumatic and violent act and can cause harm in many ways. The practice can cause severe pain, and there may be immediate and/or long-term health consequences, including pain and infection, mental health problems, difficulties in childbirth and/or death.

A female child is born to a woman who has undergone FGM.
A woman / family believe FGM is integral to cultural or religious identity.

The girl talks about a 'special procedure/ceremony' that is going to take place.

A girl talks about a long holiday to her country of origin

What are the signs?

When should I be worried?

If you are worried a girl is at risk or you believe FGM might already have happened

If an older sibling has already undergone FGM

Do not not be afraid to ask about FGM, using appropriate and sensitive language. If professionals do not give a girl the opportunity to talk about FGM, it can be very difficult for her to bring this up herself.

Who do I contact?

There is a [mandatory duty](#) to report FGM in children under 18
