The aim of the audit was to assess whether there were good multi-agency standards for managing cases and whether organisations have implemented a robust and consistent response in line with statutory and good practice guidance, SGCP policies and procedures.

The EIT is a multi agency tool to be used when you suspect a child may be at risk of or suffering exploitation. It ensures you consider a wide range of areas and issues.

• It was clear that GPs did not consistently have access to information about children's involvement with Children's Services. GPs were not consistently invited to strategy meetings nor routinely informed about outcomes of strategy meetings/ S47 investigations.

formal and clear way for concerns to be expressed

- It was apparent that at times, exploitation was viewed as the primary issue/ area for concern and professionals were not considering the possibility that the child was impacted by other traumatic lived experiences.
- There was a lack of professional curiosity/ due diligence at times which
  may have led to over-optimism. For example one child's involvement
  with Children's Services was ended on the basis that the parent told the
  practitioner that their child was now registered with a GP. However it
  was determined by BNSSG ICB that this child was actually still not
  registered with a GP.
- For one child there was an example of some significant professional differences in opinion around threshold however this was not resolved effectively through application of the Resolution of Professional Differences Policy.
- There was a risk of start again syndrome for children who had moved into South Gloucestershire from different local authority areas.
- Where relevant, probation representatives were not consistently invited to attend strategy meetings.
- EITs were not consistently reviewed in a timely manner and there were no examples of the EIT being used outside of Children's Services practitioners.

## Good Practice Identified: There was evide

- There was evidence of effective communication between multi-agency partners including good multi-agency attendance to various meetings.
- There were examples of early referrals to PIMM which have enabled sharing of intelligence and multi-agency problem solving at the earliest opportunity.
- There were examples of EITs completed effectively and sometimes in a timely manner which has supported appropriate assessment and planning for young people.
- There were examples of professionals engaging parents and involving them in safety planning for their child.
- There were examples of professionals applying persistence to enable building of positive relationships with young people.
- Barnardo's BASE were consulted appropriately around concerns relating to CSE.
