JTAI - Joint Targeted Area Inspections - What Do you need to know?

What is JTAI?

JTAI stands for Joint Targeted Area Inspection and includes inspectors from Ofsted, Care Quality Commission, HMI Constabulary and HMI Probation. There are approximately 10 JTAI inspections a year and they focus on a theme within a local authority and involve all key agencies including the local authority, health providers, police, fire and probation services.

JTAI assess how effectively agencies are working together in their local area to help and protect children. The next theme that begins in September is children living with mental health issues.

When will JTAI happen in South Gloucestershire?

We don't know. Inspections are unannounced. We know that a JTAI inspections will be restarting - following a break during the covid period. Notifications for a JTAI happen by 9.30am on a Monday.

What does this mean for me?

If you work with children in South Gloucestershire a JTAI inspection may include you. The lead inspector will use the child-level data provided by the local authority to select children whose experiences inspectors will evaluate. The lead inspector will select between five and seven children and ask the local agencies to jointly evaluate these children's experiences. The HMI Probation lead inspector will ask each of the relevant probation agencies (NPS, CRC and YOT) to share details of cases relevant to the deep dive theme for their inspectors to evaluate.

Most inspection evidence will be gathered by tracking and sampling individual children's experiences and through interviews. Inspections will focus on direct practice by:

- meeting with children, parents and carers
- scrutinising and discussing children's experiences alongside practitioners working with the child
- observing practice in multi-agency agency meetings
- examining key documents and interviewing staff to understand the support provided by senior officers and the impact of quality assurance
- evaluating the effectiveness of arrangements for safeguarding and protecting children at risk of harm.

What is happening now in South Gloucestershire?

We are preparing for JTAI by making sure every agency has key people ready to gather data and ready to respond and support you, should we get a call to say an inspection is happening. These people would let you know what is happening and keep you updated through the inspection. There will be regular updates so that we can be as ready as we can for a JTAI



Safeguarding Concerns Framework

A new <u>Safeguarding Concerns Framework</u> has been produced by the LGA and ADASS to help us to develop a common understanding of the circumstances that should lead to making a safeguarding referral to adult social care, and circumstances where other actions, outside of safeguarding processes, may be required. The framework also sets out a consistent response nationally for adult social care teams when they do receive a safeguarding concern and how that is reported. There is a helpful table on page 7 to guide people about when to make a safeguarding referral, which suggests that referrers need to be confident that the following sections of the Care Act Section 42 criteria are met:

- a) The person has needs for care and support
- b) The person is experiencing, or is at risk of abuse or neglect.

Deciding if you need to raise a safeguarding concern to the local authority/Multi-Agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH)



this from happening. If you still have concerns about abuse or neglect and it is not possible or within the scope of your role to have a conversation with the adult, then if in doubt continue with the process and raise a safeguarding concern.

We will be looking at this framework in depth to see if we can produce local guidance to support people to feel confident about when to make a safeguarding referral and when other actions maybe more appropriate.
