


Stop Adult Abuse week was last week – we saw hundreds of practitioners attend a series of lunchtime workshops.

Spotlight on Policy Updates



Since the launch of the new <u>South West Child Protection Procedures</u> website the Children's Partnership are changing the approach to local policy and Procedure documents.

Historically we have had long local documents as well as the South West Procedures and sometimes there have been slight differences which cause confusion.

We will now have shorter local guides that give local contact information that links to the South West Procedures which should help keep everything accurate and up to date and all in one place.

The first three of the new guides were published on 1st December. They replace a combined policy that was very out of date.

What Happening with JTAI?



JTAI is a Joint Targeted Area Inspection. It is a multi agency inspection of a whole local authority footprint and inspects the way we work together as organisations. The inspectorate team is made up of Ofsted, CQC and HMICFRS.

What is the current theme? There are two current themes – Serious Youth

Violence and the **Front Door** to Children's Services. If we are inspected in the next few

months it will be on one of these two themes and will look at our response to children.

Sextortion – Avon & Somerset Police Campaign

Last year alone, more than 720 people were blackmailed or bribed in Avon and Somerset through sextortion. Sextortion is when someone threatens to share sexual images or videos of you unless you do something for them - like sharing more photos or paying a sum of money.

This type of crime is sadly becoming more and more common, we've seen a repeated 40% increase in reports each year, over the last two years.

It can happen to anyone, but young males are a particular target for criminals - over 50 per cent of victims coming forward are males under 29 years old.

We want to make it harder for perpetrators to commit this devastating crime and to encourage those who are affected to come forward for help. Please watch and share this video, to help more people understand the risks involved when sharing sexual images and videos.

Making safe memories this Christmas

The team at Avon Fire & Rescue Service (AF&RS) are sharing key advice to help you stay safe at home during the festive season. With lots of people decorating their



homes and bringing some seasonal sparkle to their space, Christmas lights are always a popular choice. If you're using lights, AF&RS recommend that you:

- Use LED lights as these operate at a cooler temperature than traditional lights.
- Check your lights for any damage before putting them up. If they are damaged, dispose of them safely.
- Hang lights securely and out of reach children.
- Always turn lights off before going out or to bed.

With lot of lights and decorations, it can be tricky to find enough plug sockets for all your devices. AF&RS strongly advise you not to use multiway adapters at home, and instead opt for a surge-protected extension cable. Always check the output of your cable, and make sure that what you're plugging in does not exceed the limit. You should also ensure that you use the shortest possible cable and position out of the way so that it is not a trip hazard.

A leading cause of death among children aged 1 to 4 is hanging and strangulation (36%). We all recognise the dangers of day-to-day items and mitigate the risk wherever possible, such as choosing lanyards that have safety breaks in them, and by using cordless blinds or ensuring blind cords are tied up or secured with winders. However, seasonally there are additional risks for small children that we may be less aware of, e.g., tinsel, fairy lights, bunting, and other decorations.

We can minimise this risk by avoiding tying objects such as bunting, tinsel, garlands, and other lengths of decoration which do not break easily, where a young child can reach it and wrap it around their neck. Even if decorations are placed out of reach, ensure they are fixed securely so they do not drop down to where a child can access them. Also, be particularly mindful of any objects a child can climb on to reach them, as they could lose their footing while they have a decoration wrapped around their neck.
