

The audit of 1st May 2024 reviewed the records of six adults who were identified through Adult Safeguarding under the theme of Financial Abuse The aim of the audit was to ascertain whether there were good multiagency standards for managing cases and whether organisations have implemented a robust and consistent response in line with statutory and good practice guidance, SGSAB policies and procedures and the six key principles underpinning all adult safeguarding work.


The adults reviewed for this multi agency audit are aged between 18 and 92. 2 are female and 4 male. Two live in temporary accommodation, four live in their own home.

The adults in the audit have a range of issues in addition to financial abuse including being a care leaver, country lines, dementia, mobility issues, cuckooing, self neglect, mental & physical health conditions, mild learning difficulty

What we are worried about?

The audit group saw concerns in terms of:

- Lack of curiosity about injuries and accompanying adults presenting at ED, and also by practitioners visiting in the home when additional adults are there
- Lack of understanding about what it means to be a care leaver, and the role of a PA
- Cross border working impacting consistency of support
- Identification of someone as a victim when their behaviour is also as a perpetrator
- Lack of co-ordinated plan to help support an individual to keep exploitative individuals away from a property
- Lack of referral to substance misuse services & mental health
- GP & Sirona not aware of safeguarding concerns for one of the adults
- No referral to advocacy action taken to ensure this happens
- Reasonable adjustments not always clear when there are mild learning difficulties rather than a diagnosed learning disability
- No follow up after a telephone number was uncontactable



When there are other adults who accompany to appointments or who are in the home, be curious about who they are, and their role. Record this and their relationship to the adult

- Use a trauma informed approach.
 Think about the history of the person, and cumulative impact of events rather than just the presenting issue

When considering a plan for an individual, include other organisations and make plans multi agency

Letter to GPs should always include a clear request if the GP needs to taken action, as letters can be scanned to the system for information if it is not clear

What Good Practice did we see?

- Adult Social Care picked up a referral for a care leaver from another area to ensure they did not 'fall through the gap'
- Good record keeping, and good multi agency working while an adult was in hospital
- Problem Solving Plan undertaken by police
- Referral to High impact user team so that a plan can be put in place to support, this was successful.
- Links made with children's services when young people were identified in a cuckooing situation
- Good multi agency work between Housing and DHI evident and also between Adult Social Care and Housing
- Office for Public Guardian contacted by several agencies when there were questions about power of attorney
