7.7.1 Universal Funding

Funding for children under 2 years Old

There is no universal funding for children who are under 2 years of age. However, some children might be eligible for 15 hours of funding to enable them to access provision in a pre-school, day nursery, childminder or nursery class for 15 hours per week. This is for working families in England with children under 2 years old. Parents can check if you are eligible on the childcare choices website, and can apply online through HMRC once they have created an account.

Funding for 2 Year Olds.

There is no universal funding for children aged 2 -3 years old, however, some children might be eligible for 15 hours of funding to enable them to access provision in a preschool, day nursery, childminder or nursery class for 15 hours per week. It is for families in England, receiving certain forms of Government support with two-year-old children or for working families in England with children 2 years old. Parents can check if you are eligible on the childcare choices website, and can apply online once they have created an account, either through South Gloucestershire Citizen Portal or HMRC, depending on which entitlement your child is entitled to.

Funding for 3 and 4 year olds.

15 hours free childcare for all three and four-year-olds

The government provides funding for all three and four-year-old children to attend an Ofsted registered early years provider (for example, pre-schools, nurseries and childminders). This is known as the early education entitlement funding. It is for all families in England with three and four-year-old children. More information can be found on the childcare choices website.

30 hours free childcare for three and four-year-olds

The government provides 30 hours of free childcare or early education for 38 weeks. This is for working families in England with three and four-year-old children. Parents apply for this funding, sharing the code they are issued with to their provider.
